What is Social Capital?

Economists

- The <u>institutions</u>, <u>relationships</u>, and <u>norms</u> that shape the quality and quantity of a society's <u>social</u> <u>interactions</u>. It is not just the sum of the institutions which underpin a society, it is the <u>glue</u> that holds them together <u>World Bank Website</u>
- Individual's social characteristics that enable private returns via interaction with others. Total social capital is an aggregation that takes into account all externalities.

Social Capital Controversy: Skepticism


Economists

I would urge the <u>abandonment</u> of the term "social capital". The essence of social networks is that they are built up for reasons other than their economic value to the participants. Indeed, that is what gives them their value in monitoring.

- Petris Measure
 - Employment in voluntary organizations
 - Data source: County Business Patterns (U.S. Census)
- Match organizational types
- Compute community social capital measure as the ratio of



Social Capital Measure: Predictive Validity






Figure 1. The interrelationships among human and social capital and health.
